TOGO UPDATE

Adie and I often look back with thankfulness on the opportunity we had to start a church in the village of Bohou while we were living in Togo, West Africa. We have such wonderful memories of how God worked through the getting of land and building a church and parsonage and growing that sweet group of believers. It's now been nearly 7 years since we left Togo but God's still working at the Eglise Baptist Biblique de Bohou (Bible Baptist Church of Bohou). We keep in touch regularly and have been able to occasionally continue to support the work there.

This month, we heard from the Pastor overseeing the church and he told us that after nearly 12 years of working on the paperwork for the property, they had finally secured the "Titre Foncier". While the church has owned the property from day one, what they did not have was a governmentally recognized deed to the property and this is what the Titre Foncier is. It formally legalizes their ownership. It means that nobody will ever be able to take their property from them and if the government

wants it, they'll have to pay market value

for the land and buildings. It's a huge step and rare step for any church in Togo. We rejoice that God has provided them the peace of mind and security.
